I recently spoke at a conference exploring approaches authorities might take to educate their



ies might take to educate their communities on wastewater treatment. This gave me the opportunity to introduce Schuylkill Haven's own sewer mascot – Barry Blockage!

While you may not think much about where waste goes after you flush the toilet, there are some costly mistakes you can avoid.

Jessica Seiders Borough Admin. "Flushable" Wipes – marketed as safe-to-flush – can cause havoc inside your home/apartment's sewage piping or further downstream eventually reaching

the Borough's Wastewater Treatment Plant. These socalled "flushable wipes" **ARE NOT** safe to flush.


Wipes can cause significant damage to pipes, pumps, and other wastewater treatment equipment. Sewer backups can be a threat to public health and present a challenge to our water utilities by diverting resources away from the essential work being done to treat and manage our wastewater.

Toilet paper and human waste are the only things that should be flushed.

Disinfecting wipes, baby wipes, diapers, and paper towels should **NEVER** be flushed. All wipes and other items should be properly disposed of in the trash, not the toilet. Placing your pipes at risk for serious clogs can result in a hefty bill.



Borough Tax Collector

March and April have been a busy time with tax receiving, deposits, and reports that had to be filed. A Tax Collector must remit receivables to the Borough and County twice each month from March through June. In addition, the Per Capita records must be continually updated with people moving in and out.

Per Capita Tax explained

Let's talk about that "pesky" Per Capita bill. The Per Capita is a "head" tax on adults living in the Borough. The bill has all the pertinent information – name, address and tax collector information.

On the top right of the bill is the bill number and the amount to pay for each of the three possible paying periods – the early pay "Discount," the actual "Face" amount pay period, and the late "Penalty" period. It also notes "Delinquent after 12/31/2024."

The bill then states two amounts for payment -\$5 for the County and \$5 for the Borough. If you follow the payment schedule at top-right you can't go wrong.

Office hours or by appointment

Office hours for May and June are 12 to 3 p.m. and by appointment. Starting in July there are no set hours. Just call the office to arrange an appointment at 570-385-1313.

Pay bills by check or money order. Include a selfaddressed, stamped envelope if you need a receipt.

Per Capita Tax updates need to be provided to the tax collector. If you know of someone that's moved out of town, is recently deceased, or in a nursing home, contact the tax office right away so they can be removed from the tax rolls.

The Borough/County property taxes and per capita taxes must be paid in full when due. Installment plans are not allowed.

Keep Schuylkill Haven Beautiful ... from The Code Guy

We all know life sometimes gets a bit busy, unorganized and out of control. We also know getting things back in order, reorganized and back under our control gives one a great sense of accomplishment.

That said, living in a town comes with responsibilities. At times, some residents get too busy or seem to forget those responsibilities and the impact that has on the town as a whole.



As Code Enforcement officer, probably one of the most frequent responses I hear when giving a notice of violation for an unkempt property is "I've been so busy I haven't had the time" or some variant of that excuse. Many of those in violation are offended and annoyed because a neighbor has complained or that my office has noticed the lack of maintenance, but are forgetting their responsibility of living in a town. We're all in this together. Because we live and



share this great little town, our properties become a network and the fabric that makes up our community. Each piece, or stitch, is attached and impacts the other. That's why it's imperative every property owner takes care of their little piece of property.



So next time you get a notice, don't perceive it as my office or a neighbor is picking on you; but, rather as a reminder. If we all do our part to keep our town neat and clean, it benefits you, has a positive impact for the town and, most importantly, strengthens that fabric we're all a part of. Remember we're all a team, and sometimes it's your time to carry the ball

I encourage every property owner to walk out their front door. That's right, you're doing great! Now, take a few more steps and look down. See that? It's a sidewalk and it's your responsibility to keep all weeds and grass out of it.

I recommend spraying with a typical herbicide that can be purchased at any garden center, hardware store or most department stores. After the vegetation dies remember to remove the defeated vegetation. Brown weeds are just as ugly as green weeds and the citation for either costs the same.

Sidewalk areas

Sidewalks must be maintained and kept in good repair, void of weeds and grass, swept and cleaned of debris, and washed down occasionally.

Curbing must also be kept in good repair, void of all grass and weeds out to where the curbing and street intersect.

Trash & storage

Remember to remove all trash and recycling containers from street view as soon as possible after the scheduled pickup day.

Prior to pickup day, trash/rubbish must be kept in conventional, well-maintained trash containers with tight-sealing lids. Trash bags are acceptable, but

must be stored in a way that does not encourage or allow animals to rip them open.

Recyclables may not comingle with any household trash/rubbish, confined within the container, and not allowed to spill out or be blown away.

Yard areas

Lawns must be kept mowed to a height of 6" or less and trimmed around buildings, fences, play equipment, and the like.

General property areas should be maintained to ensure the attractiveness of the neighborhood.

Borough compost area

The compost site located at the end of St. Charles Street, a short distance behind the wastewater treatment plant, is great to aid in your seasonal yard clean up. Please remember, the site is for compost items only — grass, weeds, brush, leaf debris and the like.

The following are NOT permissible to be "dumped" at the compost site — trash, garbage, household items, construction material of any kind, dirt, brick, block, stone or like material.

Fences

Permits are required for all fencing – whether it is new, addition to, or replacement of a fence. Fences must follow height restrictions, location requirements, and minimum open ratio-structural areas as required by the Zoning Ordinance. • Front yard – any fence located in the required front yard of a lot in a residential district shall have a minimum ratio of 1:1 of open to structural areas (such as picket or split rail fence).

• Height – A fence in a residential district, that is within ten feet of a residential lot and that is not within the required front yard, shall have a maximum height of six (6) feet. Note: Contact the Code Department for exceptions.

• Setbacks – A fence shall not be required to comply with minimum setbacks for accessory structures.

• A fence may be constructed on a lot line; however, homeowners are encouraged, but not required, to set fences at least two feet from abutting lot line in order to allow for maintenance. Exceptions: (1) a fence shall not be placed within a street right of way; and (2) a fence of a business shall be set back a minimum of

five feet of the abutting lot line of an existing dwelling or undeveloped residentially zoned lot.

Animal nuisance

It's your pet and your responsibility. Your neighbor and surrounding residents didn't sign on to the care of your pet and shouldn't have to tolerate your lack of consideration and respon-


sibility or the deficiency of training regarding your furry kid (pet).

Borough Ordinance 1000 regulates the keeping of pets. A copy is available at Borough Hall for residents who are interested in obtaining a copy.

Check smoke/CO detectors

Smoke alarms and carbon monoxide (CO) detectors save lives!

Every dwelling should have smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors on each habitable level of the dwelling. Every sleeping room should have a smoke alarm.



serve a dual purpose where both are needed.

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless vapor that is sometimes produced by furnaces and space heaters. Symptoms of CO poisoning include nausea,



dizziness, severe headache, confusion, and unconsciousness. If you notice these symptoms in yourself or a family member, go to the emergency room right away.

If you have a solid fuel heating appliance, use gas-powered space heaters, a kerosene heater, or have a fireplace, install carbon monoxide detectors in your home. If you already have detectors, test them regularly. Make sure they are in proper working order and change the batteries according to manufacturer's recommendations.

Meter notification requirement

All residents and contractors performing work that requires moving, un-securing, altering or disconnection of the meter or meter base in any capacity must contact the Code Enforcement Department at 570-385-2841.

No utility customer shall permit any person – excepting an authorized officer, agent or employee of the utility – do any work upon any meter, transformer, test switch or other utility apparatus located upon the customer's premises.

Failure to comply or allow work to be performed by any individual, other than stated above, can result in utility disconnection without notice. Service will only be restored on payment in advance of a fee for reconnection and all costs related to disconnection. In the case where evidence of tampering or fraud is evident, the above fees will be assessed plus all related enforcement, restitution and court costs.

If a power outage happens during the hours of 8 a.m. through 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday notify the Borough Hall office at 570-385-2841.

After business hours or on holidays or weekends, call the non-emergency number at the Schuylkill County Communications Center at 570-628-3792 or the Schuylkill Haven Police Department at 570-385-9111. Either of those options will get the problem reported to the proper personnel and get your problem on the way to being solved as quickly and efficiently as possible.

When reporting a problem, please be as descriptive about the problem as possible and give the per-

Highway Department

Time to clean up the town! The street sweeper will be in operation the first whole week of each month with hours of operation 3 a.m. to 6 a.m. Check the sign posting on your street for the days of operation.

The street sweeper will be operating May 7-to-10, June 4-to-7, July 2-to-5, August 5-to-9, September 3-to-6, October 1-to-4, and November 5-to-8.

Yard waste – limbs, leaves, grass clippings, and other vegetative waste – will be collected curbside the second Friday of each month. Biodegradable bags made of recycled paper are a great substitute to plastic garbage bags.

All compost that is taken to the compost area is to be dumped in the designated area. Please do not dump in the area of the tub grinder. This area is for yard waste ONLY! No dirt, rock, sod, or lumber, and no logs larger than nine inches in diameter.

Water Distribution / Wastewater Collection

Summertime, yay! Beginning with Memorial Day and winding down on Labor Day, it's the best time when lawns and gardens are green and growing, school is out, vacations enjoyed, part-time summer jobs, or simply enjoying it all without set plans.

What a great time of the year. It's the time when short sleeve shirts, shorts, and flip-flops are the norm and everything looks fresh, new, alive and the windows are open!

Summertime is also our opportunity to really clean up from winter's stronghold, fill swimming pools, water lawns and gardens, and wash the car. Other than your own enthusiasm, there is one resource that makes it all possible – WATER! What a remarkable and cheap resource! We are very fortunate to live in an area of the country that has an abundance of good, pure, easy to treat water. We work very hard around the clock to provide you with this great life sustaining resource.

Schuylkill Haven has been in the water business since 1881 when the Schuylkill Haven Water & Gas Co. was formed. Around 1890, the Borough purchased the Panther Valley Reservoir and laid new pipes into Schuylkill Haven and Cressona to provide residents with fresh, clean water along with meeting the demands of a growing area. As it was back then – and holds true today – to keep a safe, clean water system running 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, it costs a lot of money.

We all need water to survive and still, what a bargain water is. Since the last water rate increase in 2016 (that had not been raised since a decade before), water costs for a residential user is about \$8.50 per 1,000 gallons used. Compare that to your Comcast bill that, if it's like mine, goes up every year no matter what. What would 1,000 gallons of gas cost today?

This summer the Water Department will be replacing 600 feet of water main on Caldwell Street due to repeated breaks on that line. The road will be closed to traffic while this construction is being done.

Also this summer, several small upgrades – replacing some old valves and adding water connections to new homes and buildings – will be made to the water system. Be aware of road closures during these repairs.

Enough said; use the water! It's the best deal out there by far. Enjoy your summer and stay safe.

Water Treatment Plant

Hello summer! Those that have been reading these little articles know that I'm not a person that likes winter. I am a "summer person" especially after a

winter like we just went through. Plentiful snow fall is good for the Borough's drinking water supply. I touched on this in the last issue of *Haven Highlights* - the need to replenish our reservoirs with winter's melting snow and spring's refreshing rains.

Now we have to prepare for the warm summer months, and it's a good feeling to know we are going to do that with reservoirs overflowing with fresh water. As the days get longer and the temperatures start rising, we don't always know how much rain will be in the forecast. So, it's always a good idea to try to conserve as much water as possible. It not only helps us maintain a good supply for the water system, it also helps the customer save a few dollars. Here are a few easy ways to do just that.

Indoors, wash only full loads of laundry and dishes, saving up to 50 gallons per week. Fixing household leaks can result in up to 20 gallons per day. Limiting your "shower time" to only five minutes saves up to eight gallons each time. Turn off the water while brushing your teeth saves up to 2-1/2 gallons per minute. When making repairs or planning a remodeling project, purchase high efficiency toilets and fixtures.

Outdoors, water your lawn only one or two days per week instead of five. This can save a whopping 840 gallons weekly. Use a broom instead of a hose to clean driveways and sidewalks, saving up to 500 gallons per month. Add a 2-to-3 inch layer of mulch around plants to reduce evaporation.

And finally, urge your family and friends to conserve. If everyone does a little, we all benefit a lot. Have a safe and enjoyable summer.

Wastewater Treatment Plant

"Oooh, that smell! Can't you smell that smell?!" That Smell by Lynyrd Skynyrd is a classic hit and it is one that we tend to hum to ourselves each spring down here at the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

During the spring and early summer, we like to complete our tank cleanings and inspections. This involves draining the tanks, washing them out, and going over each mechanical component inside the tanks.

This not only takes a long time to do, but also creates some pretty smelly odors. The higher temperatures also tend to make the smells a bit worse. We do our best to not share our odors with our neighbors, but sometimes they stretch beyond our fence line.

As a reminder, the Wastewater Treatment Plant is for authorized personnel only. No resident should enter the property without permission. If your key fob for the compost/cardboard recycling area gate is not working, contact Borough Hall located at 333 Center Avenue.
